Importance of the Water Authority's 2010 Plan

- Mandated by State Water Code Section 10610-10656
 - Utilities serving Municipal & Industrial customers more than 3,000 AF annually or more than 3,000 service connections
 - Updated every 5 years
- Official Water Authority policy document on supply and demand management planning for the region
 - In 2030 Water Authority supplies will meet over 80% of the region's need for water
 - Information in regional UWMP critical to member agency plans
 - Critical linkage to other Board actions, CEQA compliance, and used by land use jurisdictions in development approvals

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What's New for the 2010 Plan

- SBX 7-7 compliance: wholesale supplier compliance and water use efficiency target
- Integrated Regional Water Management linkage to 2010 Plan
- Multiple dry water year planning assumptions
- Scenario planning to deal with uncertainties

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Why They Are Important


- SBX 7-7 compliance
 - · First ever state mandated limit on water demand
 - Future supply, financial and facility planning will be based on compliance
 - Links conservation and recycling as a single water use efficiency target
- Integrated Regional Water Management linkage to 2010 Plan
 - IRWM is quickly becoming the umbrella document for all water supply and water quality planning
 - · Greater visibility to wider groups of stakeholders
 - · Increasingly important to future funding
 - Linkage between water management plans and land use approvals will only strengthen

Why They Are Important

- Multiple dry water year planning assumptions
 - Recent experience has shown MWD firm supplies less than expected
 - First Water Authority UWMP that shows shortages in multiple dry years
 - San Vicente Carryover and Central Valley groundwater storage needed to partially mitigate shortages
- Scenario planning to deal with uncertainties
 - State recognition of significant risk of water availability
 - Continued controversy over Bay-Delta Fix
 - Endangered Species Act limitations
 - QSA invalidation
 - MWD Rate Litigation
 - Local Projects implementation
 - Climate Change impacts

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2010 Plan - Integrated Regional Water Management • Describes IRWM Planning • Integration of water supply, water quality and natural resources planning

- Linkage between IRWM Program and 2010 Plan
 - Supports projects that increase water supply reliability and improve water quality
 - IRWM funding for projects
 - Includes supply projects identified in 2010 Plan

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2010 Plan Preparation: Coordinated Effort

- Prepared by Water Resources Department staff
 - Input from other departments (General Counsel, Finance, Public Affairs and MWD, Colorado River and Conservation Programs)
 - · Consulting assistance from Hazen and Sawyer on demand forecast
- Coordinated effort with Water Authority member agencies
 - Member agency working group
 - Provided technical review and input into plan preparation
