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DWR Small Community Drought Relief Program


- Provide immediate and near-term financial and technical support to help small communities survive the current and future droughts
- DWR has released 4 rounds of awards:
 - Round 1: ~\$25M
 - Rounds 2 & 3: ~\$28M
 - · Round 4: ~\$25M
- Applications will be processed until funds are exhausted or until December 29, 2023, whichever comes first

DWR Urban and Multibenefit Drought Relief Program

- SDFA submitted a \$5M application for the URC and Tribe Set Aside on January 13
 - 4 projects
 - 932 AFY supply reliability
- Award expected March 2022


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California Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) Prepare CA Jumpstart Program

- New, one-time, grant initiative
- \$15M to jumpstart socially vulnerable and high hazard risk communities (see map) in resilience planning
- Applications due February 28, 2022

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Proposition 1, Round 2 - Eligibility

- Eligible applicants and project sponsors:
 - Public agencies
 - 501 (c)(3) Non-profit organizations
 - Public utilities
 - Federally-recognized Indian Tribes
 - State Indian Tribes listed on the Native American Heritage Commission's Tribal Consultation list
 - Mutual water companies

Partnerships are encouraged!

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Proposition 1, Round 2 - Eligibility

- Eligible project types include:
 - · Water reuse and recycling
 - Water-use efficiency and conservation
 - Storage
 - Regional water conveyance facilities
 - Watershed protection and restoration
 - Stormwater resource management

- Conjunctive use
- Desalination
- · Decision support tools
- Water quality and treatment
- · Regional projects or programs

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Proposition 1, Round 2 - Project Eligibility

DWR Requirements

- Have quantifiable benefits that address critical statewide needs (including climate change and regional water resilience)
- Be consistent with statewide priorities
- Have an expected useful life of at least 15 years

See Self-Certification form for all requirements

Local Process Requirements

- Be included in the SDIRWM Plan
 - Stormwater projects must be in the Stormwater Resources Plan
- Meet Objective A: Integrated project
- Meet Objective B: Include community engagement



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Proposition 1, Round 2

- Funding Criteria from DWR:
 - 50% funding match required (Match funds eligible through Jan 2015)
 - DAC funding match waiver possible, partial or full
 - Costs incurred following Final Award are available for grant reimbursement
- DWR Process:



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Key Changes and Requirements - Draft PSP and GL

Changes from Round 1

- Applicants no longer need to have CEQA completed and submitted within 12 months of final award
- No Pre-Application Materials submission and workshop requirement
- Statewide Priorities updated to reflect Water Resilience Portfolio
- Grant administration costs excluded from match requirement calculation

Requirements in Round 2

- Projects must be complete by December 31, 2026
- · Submit a self-certification form
- · Simplified application for areas with funding split agreements

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SDIRWM Comments on the Draft PSP and GL


- Requested clarifications:
 - Grant administration will not be included when considering total project costs for purposes of match requirement
 - Comment: Clarify if this applies to regional grantee or also to individual LPS.
 - Projects may be removed if they fail to progress in timely fashion
 - Comment: Clarify DWR's process for determining whether project progress is timely
- Requested adjustments to schedule:
 - Extend project completion date to 5 years from agreement execution
 - If project is removed, extend the grant agreement deadline to accommodate replacement project.
